11:00-12:00	 Conservation approaches for different taxonomic groups of birds: Shorebirds Discuss how the Americas Flyways Task Force can move shorebird conservation forward, especially in the short term. (Led by representatives of the USA) Landbirds Explore the possibility of applying a place based conservation approach similar to the Western Hemisphere Shorebird Reserve Network (WHSRN) for landbirds. (Led by the representative of Canada) 		Given the existence of the Atlantic and Pacific shorebird conservation plans and several national shorebird conservation plans, shorebird conservation seems ripe for a boost from the Americas Flyways Task Force. In the case of landbirds, ongoing research into migration and overwintering sites for neotropical landbirds suggests that similar to shorebirds, landbirds congregate in hotspots or pass through bottlenecks thus a WHSRN approach could be valuable to conserve these important areas that are currently being identified
	 Seabirds Gather information on the current status of seabird bycatch strategies in the Americas, focussing on what programs, initiatives, and strategies are underway in countries throughout the Region and potential synergies. This may help determine how countries can work together to address seabird bycatch. (Led by the representative of Canada)

	Grassland birds To be dealt with at Grassland Birds MOU meeting on 24-25 July Other groups		for landbirds. Conservation of these sites, including wintering sites, is essential to full life-cycle conservation of landbirds. The success of WHSRN could be used as a model for landbird placebased conservation.
			For seabirds, Canada has an interdepartmental committee for seabird bycatch which helps the agencies work collaboratively on data collection and analysis, policy initiatives and programs related to Canada's National Plan of Action for reducing Incidental Catch of Seabirds in Longline Fisheries. The Task Force meeting is an opportunity to present information on projects underway in Canada and to determine if collaboration with other countries would be beneficial

13:00-14:00	Data management and accessibility Discuss options for data management and accessibility across the Americas. The use of a common data management system would facilitate information sharing among agencies and with the public. This discussion would need to explore and take into consideration all the data needs that exist for programs and countries. (Led by the representative of Canada)		An example of available data is the BirdCast site, which shows forecasts of bird migrations. At the moment, BirdCast does not extend past the United States, but if it did it could better inform the public of high risk periods for birds, including bird collisions with buildings. The Avian Knowledge Network may also be a tool to consider for housing and sharing avian data collected by various agencies in the western hemisphere and/or related to the work of the Task Force
