

JOINT REPORT OF CMS SECRETARIAT AND ETF COORDINATOR ON PROGRESS AGAINST THE WORKPLAN, GAPS AND OPPORTUNITIES

Introduction

- 1. The ETF Workplan 2021 2024 was introduced in the fifth meeting of the ETF (ETF5) based on the review of the performance of the ETF for the period 2018-2020. 2024 is its final year after having successfully guided the direction of the ETF over the recent years.
- 2. This document presents a review of the implementation of the ETF workplan 2021 2024 and progress against the workplan activities, identifying the key successes, gaps and challenges, and opportunities for the next workplan.
- 3. A preliminary analysis indicates that the present workplan has been successful in achieving many of its goals and fulfilling its tasks, despite limited funding and capacity. Around 46% of the activities were completed along with an additional 29% of the activities started and in progress. Due to the ETF's visibility and constant engagement in multilateral environmental processes and agreements, and other international conferences, the ETF was joined by thirty new members and observers since the establishment of the current workplan. Further, new stakeholders continue to show interest in engaging with the ETF, especially from the private sector, including the renewable energy industry and private consultants. Overall, the ETF fell short of achieving activities related to stimulating research to expand the evidence base for making planning and mitigation decisions.



Analysis of results

4. Out of the total 48 activities, 22 activities (46%) have reached completion or are currently ongoing, 14 activities (29%) have been started and are in progress, 12 activities (25%) have not commenced yet. Predominantly, most activity lines have reached fruition or have been initiated and are in progress.



- 5. <u>Activity 1: Promote implementation of relevant guidelines adopted in the frameworks</u> <u>of the participating MEAs:</u> Approximately 33% of the activities have commenced, while the remainder have concluded or are ongoing.
- 6. <u>Activity 2: Promote mainstreaming migratory species conservation into corporate and financial decision-making:</u> 60% of the activities are completed or are ongoing, 20% of the activities have been started and are in progress, whereas 20% of the activities have not begun yet.
- 7. <u>Activity 3: Priority Setting:</u> All activities are ongoing or completed.
- 8. <u>Activity 4: Mobilising resources:</u> 75% of the activities are in progress but not yet finalised, while the remainder of it has not commenced yet.
- 9. <u>Activity 5: Monitoring implementation and impediments to implementation:</u> 50% of the activities have concluded or are ongoing, whereas the rest of it has been started and is in progress.
- 10. <u>Activity 6: Stimulating communication and information exchange:</u> 64% of the activities are completed or are ongoing, 29% are in progress and 7% haven't commenced yet.
- 11. <u>Activity 7: Strengthening regional and international networks:</u> 75% of the activities have been started and are in progress, while the remainder have yet to begin.
- 12. <u>Activity 8: Stimulating research:</u> The majority, approximately 90%, of activities have not yet commenced, with the remaining activity (10%) already completed.

Overall progress and successes of the ETF

- 13. The ETF is extremely grateful to the voluntary contributions of the government of France, through the Ministère de la Transition écologique et solidaire and L'Office français de la biodiversité (OFB) France; Government of the Federal Republic of Germany, through the Federal Ministry for the Environment, Nature Conservation, and Nuclear Safety (BMU); and the Government of India, through the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change who was recognized as Champion Plus for their generous support and commitment towards making energy safe for wildlife for the period 2020-2023.
- 14. The ETF has made notable strides in fulfilling its mandate under the 2021 -2024 work plan despite the challenges posed by limited funding and staff resources. Multiple interim meetings (April 2021, December 2021, October 2022, December 2022, February 2023, October 2023) and webinars, focusing on different geographical regions like the Americas, Middle East and North Africa, were successfully organized. Further webinars are planned during 2024, in partnership with the United Nations Environment Programme-World Conservation Monitoring Centre (UNEP-WCMC) on private sector engagement and Renewables Grid Initiative (RGI) on biodiversity protection along grids. Some of other key achievements include:
 - a. The launch of the <u>Good Practice Handbook on Post-Construction Bird and Bat</u> <u>Fatality Monitoring (PCFM) for Onshore Wind Energy Facilities in Emerging</u> <u>Market Countries and its Decision Support Tool,</u>
 - b. <u>Sustainable deployment of renewable energy technologies and power lines:</u> <u>avoiding and mitigating negative impacts on biodiversity</u> as a key guiding resource document for the ETF,
 - c. Avian Sensitivity Tool for Energy Planning (<u>AVISTEP</u>), to identify where renewable energy could impact birds and should therefore be avoided, and the <u>TransMit toolkit</u>, for mitigating powerline-related avian mortality, This underscores the ETF's commitment to addressing avian sensitivity in energy planning.

The full list of recent achievements can be found in the <u>Joint Report of the CMS</u> <u>Secretariat and ETF Coordinator on Activities of the ETF (ETF7/Doc.2)</u>.

- 15. Moreover, in the duration of the present workplan, thirty new members and observers joined the ETF, expanding its reach and impact and reflecting the growing recognition of ETF's importance, for example, government agencies like the National Center for Wildlife (NCW), Saudi Arabia; Game & Fauna Services (GFS), Ministry of Interior, Cyprus; New Zealand Department of Conservation; Secretariats of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and Ramsar Convention; multilateral development banks like World Bank; African Development Bank, Asian Development Bank; and non-governmental organisations like Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB); China Biodiversity Conservation and Green Development Foundation; and Association for the Conservation of Biodiversity of Kazakhstan (ACBK), among others.
- 16. Additionally, the importance and relevance of the ETF were also reiterated by the reports submitted to (see documents: <u>UNEP/CMS/COP13/Doc.26.4.2.1</u>; <u>UNEP/CMS/COP14/Doc.30.3.2</u>) and resolutions and decisions adopted by the CMS Conference of the Parties (COP) as at its 13th meeting (COP13; <u>Resolution 11.27</u> (<u>Rev.COP13</u>) *Renewable Energy and Migratory Species* and 14th meeting (COP14; <u>CMS Decisions 14.207-14.210</u>).
- 17. ETF's visibility was reinforced at key conferences and events, reaffirming its role in global conservation efforts. These included the Conference on Wind energy and Wildlife impacts

(CWW), Bat Research Online Symposium, International Seminar on Wind Energy and Biodiversity, European Vulture Conference, New York Climate Week, WindEurope Annual Event, Meeting of Signatories (MOS3) to the Raptors MOU, among others (see Document <u>ETF7/Doc.2</u> for details). Members of the ETF also conducted side events at the CMS COPs, held in 2021 and 2024, and the UNFCCC COPs and Meeting of the Subsidiary Bodies, held in 2022, and 2023.

18. Regular newsletters have been published to disseminate information, enhancing communication among members and observers. Until now, five newsletters have been published: <u>May 2020</u>, <u>October 2020</u>, <u>October 2021</u>, <u>July 2023</u>, and <u>January 2024</u>.

Challenges and shortcomings

- 19. While progress has been commendable, challenges persist, particularly in fulfilling activities in mobilizing resources and stimulating research. This was mainly due to the limited funding available to implement the ETF workplan and the need to expand the ETF's remit to include new geographies and energy production methods. The ETF acknowledges the need to scale up the resource mobilization needed to address these challenges.
- 20. Efforts to engage potential donors yielded limited results, necessitating a more focused approach to independent funding opportunities. A more concerted and focused effort from the ETF membership is required to identify funding opportunities to undertake further activities and support national partners to carry out activities nationally. This would potentially require dedicated capacity and funding to create proposals for grants and funding opportunities.
- 21. In stimulating research, most activities were also not achieved due to a lack of funding and capacity. The only activity that could be fulfilled was the creation of the <u>Good Practice</u> <u>Handbook</u>, fully funded and delivered by the International Finance Corporation.

Next steps: A future workplan

- 22. The key priorities for the next workplan proposed are:
 - Implementation of ETF strategies: In the ongoing ETF workplan 2021-2024, the ETF succeeded in the creation of several strategic documents, namely the IFI Engagement package, private sector engagement strategy, communications strategy, and geographic expansion strategy. In the next workplan, these strategies aim to be implemented, through the definition of specific actions, to deliver its objectives.
 - Implement the CMS COP14 mandate, specifically the CMS Decisions on Renewable Energy and Migratory Species, including the request to expand the scope of the ETF to include impacts to aquatic mammals.
 - Ensure the new ETF workplan contains goals and activities that are well aligned with those included in the recently approved CMS Samarkand Strategic Plan for Migratory Species 2024-2032
 - Under 'promote implementation of relevant guidelines adopted in the frameworks of the participating MEAs', the next workplan could:

- Continue preparing and disseminating information packages, guidelines, and best practice examples, including fact sheets and information about existing decision support tools,
- Create guidance useful for financial institutions, many of whom recently joined the ETF,
- Create guidance on emerging renewable energy sectors and its potential impacts to migratory species (birds, bats and aquatic mammals).
- Promote available guidance in the six official languages of the UN, to stay relevant and useful for all ETF members and observers.
- Under 'promote mainstreaming migratory species conservation into corporate and financial decision-making', the next workplan could:
 - Continue identifying, building partnerships and establishing pilot initiatives with relevant stakeholders in the renewable energy industry and financial sector, to encourage nature-safe practices,
 - o Implement the private sector engagement strategy,
 - Continue other activities, building on the successes achieved in the present workplan.
- Under 'mobilising resources', the next workplan could:
 - Create a new fundraising strategy to raise funds to support the implementation of unfinished activities of the present and the next workplan,
 - Include activities related to the preparation of funding and grant proposals to catalyse the development of decision-support tools and support members to carry out national activities.
- Under 'stimulating communication and information exchange', the next workplan could:
 - Prioritise the implementation of the communications strategy to showcase the work of the ETF to audiences beyond the ETF to generate interest and potentially acquire funding in the future,
 - Include further activities that could be undertaken by Technical and Powerlines working groups to stimulate further research to publish relevant guidelines that could benefit new and existing ETF members and observers,
 - Aim to improve communications and resource dissemination of ETF materials related to non-avian species to all ETF members and observers,
 - Implement the ETF Award Scheme to recognise outstanding contributions from selected ETF members and observers, incentivising them to continue their efforts and serve as a catalyst for others to contribute more actively.
- Under 'strengthening regional and international networks', the next workplan could:
 - Aim to implement the geographic expansion strategy, as highlighted before, with a special focus on the Americas, Africa, and Asia-Pacific.
- On 'stimulating research', based on the ETF7 discussions on new research priorities, a list of activities could be created and added to the new workplan, those activities still considered needed and not implemented in the previous workplan could be integrated into the new version.

Budget requirement

23. The ETF has significantly grown in both size and ambition since its first meeting in 2016 and the adoption of the 2021-2024 workplan. As a result, the resources required for it to functionally meet the identified objectives are significantly higher due to the increased number of Parties, other member countries and organisations and observers, and subsequent activities. The budget scenario proposed allows for continued moderate growth and impactful delivery of a new workplan and the ETF's mandate, particularly regarding the rapidly growing interest and awareness of the state of biodiversity loss, global commitments to triple renewable energy in response to climate change, and major threat to migratory species from renewable energy infrastructure if not managed correctly. A substantial increase in funding is needed to meet the expected rise in expenditure.
