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REVIEW OF DECISIONS

(prepared by the Secretariat)

Summary

Resolution 11.6 directs the Secretariat to prepare a list of COP Resolutions that should be completely repealed and parts of Resolutions and Recommendations that should be repealed and present the report to the 45th Standing Committee for its consideration.

The Secretariat hereby requests the Standing Committee to consider this report provided in accordance with the Resolution and to make its recommendations for COP12.

REPORT OF REVIEW OF DECISIONS

(Resolution 11.6)

Background

1. At COP11, the Parties adopted Resolution 11.6, *Review of Decisions*. This Resolution adopts two definitions for decisions adopted by the Parties, "Resolutions" and "Decisions":

Resolution: Resolutions represent a decision of Parties, adopted at a Meeting of the Conference of the Parties, regarding the interpretation of the Convention or the application of its provisions. Resolutions are generally intended to provide long-standing guidance with respect to the Convention. Resolutions include decisions on how to interpret and implement the provisions of the Convention, establishing permanent committees, establishing long-term processes, and establishing the budgets of the Secretariat.

Decision: Decisions represent a decision of the Parties, adopted at a Meeting of the Conference of the Parties, containing recommendations to Parties or instructions to a specific committee or the Secretariat. They are typically intended to remain in effect for a short period only, usually until a particular task has been completed. Decisions may, for example, request a report to be submitted to the Meeting of the Conference of the Parties following that at which they were adopted, and so would remain in effect from one Meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the next.

- 2. With the adoption of these definitions, the Parties eliminated "Recommendations," a name for some decisions adopted by the Parties at various times.
- 3. Consequently, Paragraph 4 of Resolution 11.6 directed the Secretariat to undertake a review of existing Resolutions and Recommendations. Specifically, Resolution 11.6 directed the Secretariat:
 - (a) to prepare a list of (1) Resolutions and Recommendations that should be repealed and (2) and parts of Resolutions and Recommendations that should be repealed;
 - (b) when preparing these lists, to state the reason for repealing the Resolution or Recommendation or part thereof (Work Completed, Superseded, Incorporated Elsewhere);
 - (c) when recommending only a part of a Resolution or Recommendation to be repealed, to indicate clearly the parts of a Resolution or Recommendation to be repealed;
 - (d) when preparing these lists, to recommend renaming Recommendations as Resolutions or Decisions, as appropriate; and
 - (e) to submit these lists to the Standing Committee for its 45th Meeting.
- 4. To that end, this paper creates the following five Annexes:
 - (a) Annex 1: Resolutions or recommendations previously repealed by other resolutions or recommendations;
 - (b) Annex 2: Resolutions or recommendations that should be repealed in full because the work has been completed, the resolution or recommendation has been superseded, or the resolution or recommendation has been incorporated elsewhere;

- (c) Annex 3: Resolutions or recommendations that should be repealed in part because some aspects of the resolution have been completed, superseded, or incorporated elsewhere;
- (d) Annex 4: Resolutions and Recommendations to retain without changes; and
- (e) Annex 5: A summary set of tables of Resolutions already repealed, to be fully repealed, to be partially repealed, and to be fully retained.
- 5. The members of the Standing Committee will notice a large number of resolutions and recommendations to be repealed in full or in part. Two major reasons are the cause of this. First, a large number of resolutions and recommendations include timebound instructions to the Secretariat, the Scientific Council, or another body. Over the course of the Convention's 30 years, most of these timebound tasks have been completed. Second, as new scientific, technical and other information has become available, the Parties have evolved their thinking on how to address certain issues. As a consequence, the Parties have adopted new resolutions to address these issues, resulting in previous resolutions becoming out of date or superseded.

Advice on a Registry

- 6. Paragraph 3 of Resolution 11.6 directs the Secretariat to establish registers of Resolutions by theme and whether the Resolution or Decision is in force. In addition, the Parties directed the Secretariat to create a register of all Resolutions, Recommendations, and Decisions adopted by the Parties for historical purposes.
- 7. For those Resolutions and Decisions in force after the Twelfth Meeting of the Conference of the Parties, this paper proposes to create two new links from the "Documents" menu of the CMS website, one for Resolutions and one for Decisions. From these links, website users will be directed to those Resolutions or Decisions in force. The Resolutions and Decisions would be organized based on the year they were adopted or by theme. The website of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Flora and Fauna (CITES) provides an example of what this might look like. To view it, visit www.cites.org and click on "Documents" from the menu.
- 8. If the Parties consolidate the Resolutions identified in this paper, they may find that organizing Resolutions by theme is not necessary because the Parties will have a much smaller number of Resolutions to consider. In addition, organizing by theme may be challenging because many resolutions will be in a theme by themselves (e.g., World Wildlife Day). Nonetheless, if the Parties believe that organizing Resolutions by theme would be valuable, this paper proposes the following themes:
 - (a) *Institutions*. This theme would include the Terms of Reference for the Standing Committee, Scientific Council and any other subsidiary body established by the Parties.
 - (b) *Planning*. This theme would include Resolutions relating to the budget, Strategic Plan, and communication and outreach.
 - (c) *Interpretation of the Convention*. This theme would include Resolutions that define key terms (e.g., "migratory species", "Resolutions,").
 - (d) Species or CMS Instruments. This theme would include Resolutions relating to Concerted Actions, Agreements, Action Plans, and specific species or groups of species.
 - (e) National Reports/Information Management.
 - (f) Threats to Migratory Species. This theme would include resolutions addressing renewable energy, pollution, illegal killing, bycatch, and other issues relating to threats to migratory species.
 - (g) Taxonomy and Nomenclature.

9. Decisions could be organized by the same themes as Resolutions. It would also be valuable to organize Decisions based on which entity (Parties, Standing Committee, Scientific Council, Secretariat, or others) is instructed to undertake an activity.

General Comments on Resolutions and Decisions

10. The review of every Resolution and Recommendation has also provided an opportunity to make some general comments about the provisions of some resolutions and recommendations. These comments relate to possibilities to consolidate resolutions on the same or similar themes, drafting new resolutions and provisions in light of the distinction made at COP11 between "Resolutions" and "Decisions," and other issues.

Consolidation of Resolutions and Recommendations on Similar Themes

- 11. The Parties may wish to use this report as the basis for repealing or consolidating all Resolutions. In that way, CMS would start with a clean slate. Such an exercise may entail more work than can be accomplished prior to COP12. If the Parties choose to consolidate Resolutions over two or more meetings of the Conference of the Parties, the Parties may wish to prioritize Resolutions regarding the themes described in the following paragraphs.
- 12. *Scientific Council*. The Conference of the Parties should repeal or consolidate all extant paragraphs relating to the Scientific Council when it adopts new terms of reference and Rules of Procedure for the Scientific Council pursuant to paragraph (5) of Resolution 11.4, *Restructuring of the Scientific Council*. These paragraphs can be found in:
 - (a) Resolution 1.4:
 - (b) Resolution 3.5;
 - (c) Resolution 4.14;
 - (d) Resolution 6.7;
 - (e) Resolution 7.12;
 - (f) Resolution 8.21; and
 - (g) Resolution 11.4.
- 13. *National Reports*. Three resolutions include instructions for the completion of national reports some of which have been superseded but others which remain in effect. The Conference of the Parties should consolidate the extant paragraphs of the following resolutions:
 - (a) Resolution 4.1;
 - (b) Resolution 6.5; and
 - (c) Resolution 9.4.
- 14. *Taxonomy*. The Parties should repeal or consolidate all extant paragraphs relating to taxonomy into a single resolution. Any subsequent changes to the list of standard references will be achieved through a revision to this resolution. These paragraphs can be found in:
 - (a) Resolution 6.1;
 - (b) Resolution 9.4;
 - (c) Resolution 10.13; and
 - (d) Resolution 11.19.

15. Concerted Actions. Resolution 11.13, Concerted and Cooperative Actions, calls for a consolidation of the process for designating species for concerted and cooperative actions. In the course of reviewing the many resolutions and recommendations on these issues, it became easier to draft a consolidated resolution than comment on each paragraph of the many resolutions and recommendations on these two processes. A proposed consolidated resolution is attached as Annex 6. The structure of the consolidated resolution is to create a resolution that does not need to be redrafted at each COP. Instead, any subsequent changes to the list of species identified as needing Concerted Actions would occur through revisions to the new, consolidated resolution.

The paper has found that all resolutions and recommendations relating to Concerted and Cooperative Actions have been superseded by Resolution 11.13. For completeness, this paper lists all of the resolutions and recommendations addressing Concerted and Cooperative Actions:

- (a) Resolution 3.2;
- (b) Resolution 4.2;
- (c) Resolution 5.1;
- (d) Resolution 6.1;
- (e) Resolution 7.1;
- (f) Resolution 8.29
- (g) Resolution 9.1
- (h) Resolution 10.23
- (i) Resolution 11.13;
- (j) Recommendation 5.2;
- (k) Recommendation 6.2;
- (l) Recommendation 7.1; and
- (m) Recommendation 8.28.
- 16. *Bycatch*. The Parties should consolidate all extant paragraphs relating to bycatch found in the following resolutions and recommendations:
 - (a) Resolution 6.2;
 - (b) Recommendation 7.2;
 - (c) Resolution 8.14;
 - (d) Resolution 9.18; and
 - (e) Resolution 10.14.
- 17. Climate Change. It is not clear whether the Parties intended Resolution 11.26, Programme of Work on Climate Change and Migratory Species, to supersede Resolution 10.19, Migratory Species Conservation in the Light of Climate Change. If so, then they should delete Resolution 10.19. If not, then they should consolidate the two resolutions. This report concludes that Recommendation 5.5, Resolution 8.13, and Resolution 9.7, which also address climate change, have been superseded. However, if the Parties do not agree, then the extant provisions of that recommendation and those resolutions should also be consolidated.
- 18. *Marine Turtles*. The Parties may wish to consolidate Recommendation 7.16, Improving the Conservation Status of the Leatherback Turtle (*Dermochelys coriacea*), and Recommendation 8.17, *Marine Turtles*.

- 19. *Wildlife Disease*. Three different resolutions address wildlife disease, with two of them focusing on avian flu. The Parties may wish to consolidate the extant paragraphs of these resolutions:
 - (a) Resolution 8.27, Migratory Species and Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza;
 - (b) Resolution 9.8, Responding to the Challenge of Emerging and Re-emerging Diseases in Migratory Species, including Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza H5N1; and (c) Resolution 10.22, Wildlife Disease and Migratory Species.
- 20. *Noise*. The Parties may wish to consolidate the extant paragraphs of two resolutions addressing noise:
 - (a) Resolution 9.19, Adverse Anthropogenic Marine/Ocean Noise Impacts on Cetaceans and other Biota; and
 - (b) Resolution 10.24, Further Steps to Abate Underwater Noise Pollution for the Protection of Cetaceans and Other Migratory Biota.
- 21. *Flyways*. The Parties may wish to consolidate the extant paragraphs of two resolutions addressing flyways:
 - (a) Resolution 10.10, Guidance on Global Flyway Conservation and Options for Policy Arrangements; and
 - (b) Resolution 11.14, Programme of Work on Migratory Birds and Flyways

Formulating Text for Future Resolutions and Decisions

- 22. Based on a review of resolutions, it may be helpful to keep the following issues in mind when drafting text for future Resolutions and Decisions.
- 23. Previous resolutions have been organized by theme and included both obligations that are intended to guide the Parties over the long term as well as obligations that direct the Secretariat or another CMS entity to implement a task by a specific date. In other words, previous resolutions have included provisions that meet the new definitions of "Resolution" and "Decision." In the future, the Parties and the Secretariat will need to correctly identify the type of decision to be adopted. This requires only a small change in how documents are presented to a meeting of the Conference of the Parties. A proponent will begin, as always, with a background document, to be followed by an annex that includes a draft Resolution and an additional annex that includes relevant draft Decisions.
- 24. *Referenced documents*. In several resolutions, the Conference of the Parties "welcomes," "endorses" or "takes note" of a document without an expectation that the Parties implement the recommendations in that document. In these circumstances, the Parties should include the reference to that document in the preamble as the provision includes no obligation or interpretation of the Convention.
- 25. In other resolutions, the Parties adopt recommendations or guidelines of the Scientific Council or another body that are included in another document. Because there is an expectation that those recommendations or guidelines will be implemented, the Parties should expressly include those recommendations or guidelines as an annex to the resolution. Otherwise, Parties, the Secretariat, and others must review the Scientific Council's report or the other document in order to find and implement those recommendations.

- 26. A number of resolutions include paragraphs in which the Conference of the Parties "welcomes" the adoption of a specified document. These provisions, which have no substantive impact on implementation of the Convention, are better placed in the preamble of a resolution.
- 27. Reporting. Many resolutions include reporting obligations. If they are intended to be ongoing reporting obligations (e.g., for the Parties or Secretariat to report to each meeting of the Conference of the Parties), then the reporting obligation should be included in a resolution. If the reporting obligation is intended to be timebound (e.g., to report to a specified meeting of the Standing Committee), then the reporting obligations should be included in a Decision.

Brief Explanation of Terms Used in the Annexes

- 28. Resolutions that have been "repealed" differ from those that have been "superseded" or are "out of date." The Parties have taken explicit action to "repeal" resolutions or paragraphs of resolutions in later Resolutions. No further action is required.
- 29. Resolutions or paragraphs of resolutions that have been "superseded" are those that have material completely covered by a subsequent resolution. In some cases, a paragraph from an earlier resolution is included *verbatim* or nearly *verbatim* in a later resolution. At other times, as with budgets, it is clear that the new budget is intended to replace (that is, supersede) the earlier budget. Nonetheless, the Parties have not taken official action to "repeal" the earlier budget even though earlier resolution has no value for implementation of CMS. This report recommends that the Parties formally "repeal" those resolutions and paragraphs of resolutions that have been "superseded."
- 30. Resolutions that are "out of date" are those that reference documents or issues that are no longer relevant in some way. For example, a resolution might reference a document from another MEA or international institution that has been amended or replaced by a subsequent version.
- 31. The following tables are provided so that the Parties have a complete picture of the status of all resolutions ever adopted.

Annex 6

DRAFT RESOLUTION

CONCERTED ACTIONS

Recalling the preamble of the Convention which refers to the Parties' conviction that conservation and management of migratory species require the concerted action of all Range States;

Further recalling Resolution 3.2 which instructed the Secretariat and the Scientific Council to encourage and assist Parties to take concerted actions to implement the provisions of the Convention, and which initiated a process for each meeting of the Conference of Parties to recommend initiatives to benefit a selected number of species listed in Appendix I;

Further recalling Recommendation 5.2 which introduced the concept of "Cooperative Action" as a rapid mechanism to assist the conservation of species listed in Appendix II and to act as a precursor or alternative to the conclusion for any of those species of an agreement under Article IV;

Recalling also Resolution 3.2, as updated by Resolutions 4.2, 5.1, 6.1, 7.1, 8.29, 9.1, 10.23, and 11.13 and Recommendation 6.2, as updated by Recommendations 7.1, 8.28, and Resolution 9.1, 10.23, and 11.13, which advise the Secretariat and the Scientific Council to encourage and assist Parties to take Concerted and Cooperative Actions to implement the provisions of the Convention and to improve the conservation status of certain listed migratory species;

Desiring to consolidate Concerted Actions and Cooperative Actions into a single process, as described in Resolution 11.13;

The Conference of the Parties to the Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species of Wild Animals

- 1. *Determines* that Concerted Actions are conservation measures, projects, or institutional arrangements undertaken to improve the conservation status of selected Appendix I and Appendix II species or selected groups of Appendix I and Appendix II species that
 - (a) involve measures that are the collective responsibility of Parties acting in concert, and which tend to be set out in Action Plans; or
 - (b) are designed to support the conclusion of an instrument under Article IV of the Convention and enable conservation measures to be progressed in the meantime or represent an alternative to such an instrument;
- 2. *Instructs* the Scientific Council to propose for each meeting of the Conference of the Parties a list of species for Concerted Actions;
- 3. *Recommends* that proposals for the designation of a species for Concerted Actions include the information contained in Annex 1, compiled as far as possible to provide a balanced assessment of the advantages and risks associated with each issue;

- 4. *Encourages* Parties to ensure that all initiatives to undertake Concerted Actions specify the conservation and institutional outcomes expected and the timeframes within which these outcomes should be achieved;
- 5. Decides that projects and initiatives already begun as Cooperative Actions under earlier decisions of the Conference of the Parties are unaffected by this Resolution but that these actions be subject to review by the Scientific Council and the Conference of the Parties, subject to the information included in Annex 1, along with any information about progress towards and impact of implementing those actions. Such review may conclude, *inter alia*, that the objectives of a given action have been achieved and it has been completed, or that it should continue within the terms of the unified Concerted Actions mechanism (and be re-named accordingly);
- 6. *Urges* Parties to provide the in-kind and financial means required to support targeted conservation measures aimed at implementing Concerted Actions for the species listed in Annex 2 to this Resolution;
- 7. Adopts the lists of species designated for Concerted Actions in Annex 2 of this Resolution, and encourages Parties and other stakeholders to identify and undertake activities aimed at implementing Concerted Actions to improve the conservation status of listed species, including the preparation of species action plans;
- 8. *Requests* the Scientific Council to:
 - (a) nominate, for each species and/or taxonomic group listed for concerted action, a member of the Council or a designated alternative expert to be responsible for providing a concise written report to each meeting of the Council on progress in the implementation of actions for the species or taxonomic group concerned;
 - (b) confirm at each subsequent meeting of the Scientific Council that these nominations remain valid or agree alternative nominations as necessary
- 9. *Repeals* Resolutions 3.2, 4.2, 5.1, 6.1, 7.1, 8.29, 9.1, 10.23, and 11.13 and Recommendations 5.2, 6.2, 7.1, and 8.28.

Annex 1 of the Draft Resolution¹ Information to Include in Proposals for Concerted Actions

A. Target species/population(s), and their status in CMS Appendices

A concerted action may address a single species, lower taxon or population, or a group of taxa with needs in common. The target animals in each case should be clearly defined, including by reference to their status in terms of the CMS Appendices and the geographical range(s) concerned.

B. The case for action

To be assessed according to the following criteria:

(i) Conservation priority

May relate to the degree of endangerment or unfavourable conservation status as defined under the Convention; the urgency with which a particular kind of action is required; and other priorities expressed in CMS decisions.

(ii) Relevance

May relate to the degree to which the particular conservation problem is linked to migration and requires collective multilateral action; and the degree to which the proposed action will fulfil specific CMS mandates.

(iii) Absence of better remedies

An options analysis to test whether (and why) a CMS Concerted Action is the best method of meeting the defined conservation need. Alternatives both within and outside the mechanisms of the CMS should be considered².

(iv) Readiness and feasibility

The proposal will need to demonstrate meaningful prospects for funding and leadership, and to address all significant issues of practical feasibility for undertaking the action.

(v) Likelihood of success

Feasibility (see previous criterion) only concerns whether an action is likely to be implementable. Criterion (v) seeks in addition to assess whether implementation is likely to lead to the intended outcome. Risk factors to consider include: uncertainty about the ecological effects; weakness in the underpinning science; lack of a "legacy mechanism" by which results can be sustained; and activities by others that may undermine or negate the results of the action.

(vi) Magnitude of likely impact

Proposals that are equal in other respects might be prioritized according to the number of species, number of countries or extent of area that will benefit in each case; the scope for catalytic or "multiplier" effects, contribution to synergies or potential for acting as "flagship" cases for broadening outreach.

(vii) Cost-effectiveness

Proposals should specify the resources they require, but should also relate these to the scale of impact expected, so that cost-effectiveness can be judged.

C. Activities and expected outcomes

Activities to be undertaken should be specified, and their expected outcomes defined. This should address both institutional aspects (e.g. development of an Action Plan) and ecological aspects (e.g. targets for improved conservation status). Following the SMART standard (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, Time-bound) will help; and the intended process for monitoring & evaluation should also be described.

D. Associated benefits

Opportunities to maximise added value should be identified, for example where actions targeting certain migratory animals may incidentally benefit other migratory species/taxa/populations, or where there is good scope for awareness-raising, capacity-building or encouraging new Party accessions.

E. Timeframe

Any elements of the action that are intended to be open-ended (e.g. measures to maintain conservation status) should be identified as such; and otherwise completion timeframes (and progress milestones where possible) should be specified.

F. Relationship to other CMS actions

Information should be given on how the action's implementation will relate to other areas of CMS activity. This may form part of its purpose, for example if it is designed to lead to an Agreement; or it may involve showing how the action will support the Strategic Plan or COP decisions. It may also be necessary to show how different Concerted Actions complement or interact with each other.

Annex 2 Species Designated for Concerted Actions
