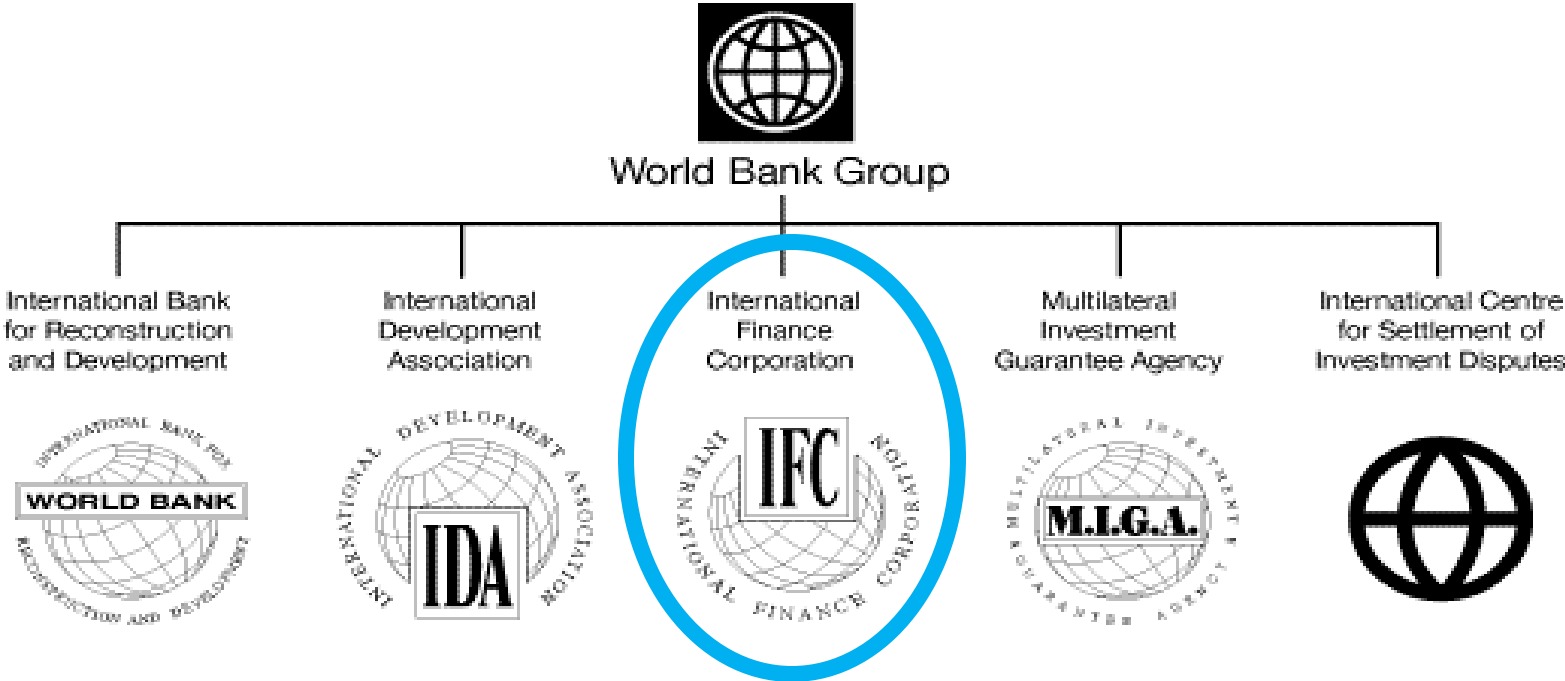

Biodiversity in 3 buckets



More risks, more requirements

- ✓ **PS6 applies if significant biodiversity values found**
 - ✓ **Minimize impacts & mitigate as appropriate**

- 
- ✓ **Alternatives analysis: No viable options in MH**
 - ✓ **Stakeholder views on impacts**
 - ✓ **No net loss for NH where feasible**

- 
- ✓ **Alternatives analysis: No viable options in MH or NH**
 - ✓ **Net gain for CH values**
 - ✓ **Biodiversity Action Plan (BAP)**
 - ✓ **Biodiversity Monitoring & Evaluation Plan (BMEP)**
 - ✓ **IF biodiversity offsets used, provide technical rationale**

PS6 & migratory species

- Explicitly guided by and designed to support implementation of applicable international law and conventions, including CMS.
- Critical Habitat includes Criterion 3: Migratory and Congregatory Species. Aligned with IBA/KBA thresholds.
- Protected area requirements apply to Key Biodiversity Areas and Ramsar sites.

Great Apes & expert inputs

- GN73. Special consideration should be given to great apes (gorillas, orangutans, chimpanzees and bonobos) due to their anthropological significance. Where great apes may potentially occur, the IUCN/Species Survival Commission (SSC) Primate Specialist Group (PSG) Section on Great Apes (SGA) must be consulted as early as possible to assist in the determination of the occurrence of great apes in the project's area of influence. Any area where there are great apes is likely to be treated as critical habitat. Projects in such areas will be acceptable only in exceptional circumstances, and individuals from the IUCN/SSC PSG SGA must be involved in the development of any mitigation strategy.
- IFC encourages collaboration with IUCN experts in various ways: Advisors; Service providers; Reviewers; Implementing partners; Auditors; Raising concerns and gaps

Project Information

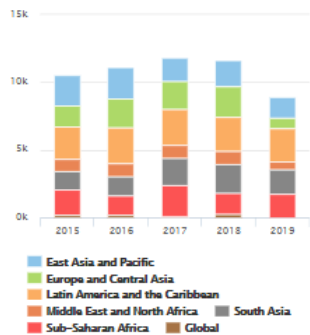
For each proposed investment or advisory services project, IFC discloses relevant project information, environmental and social implications, and expected development impact. Investments are disclosed prior to consideration by IFC's Board of Directors, and advisory projects are disclosed following project approval.

Early Disclosure

For those projects with potentially significant adverse environmental or social risks, IFC may disclose an Environmental and Social Impact Assessment (ESIA) prepared by the client in an Early Disclosure before IFC has completed its investment review.

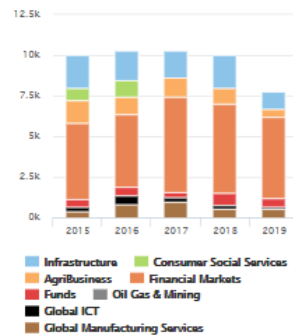
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Long-Term Commitments by Region
