



Intergovernmental Task Force on Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade of Migratory Birds in the Mediterranean



The Intergovernmental Task Force on Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade of Migratory Birds in the Mediterranean (MIKT) has been convened by the CMS Secretariat in conjunction with the Secretariat of AEWA, the Raptors MOU Coordinating Unit and the African-Eurasian Migratory Landbirds Action Plan (AEMLAP) Working Group. It brings together governmental representatives of CMS Parties from the Mediterranean region, including European Union Member States, and other interested Parties. Representatives from non-CMS Parties as well as relevant international organizations and networks are also part of MIKT as observers...

As of September 2022, the Membership of the Task Force consists of 22 CMS Parties. Additionally, three Interested Parties (CMS Parties which do not have a Mediterranean coast), and one Non-Party are Observers to the MIKT. Twelve multilateral environmental agreements (represented by their Secretariats), organizations and networks, and nine non-governmental organizations (NGOs) are Observers to MIKT. A list of all Members and Observers can be found below.

Finally, MIKT collaborates with other international organisations involved in wildlife crime, on an ad hoc basis, such as IMPEL.

The establishment of the Task Force was mandated through CMS COP Resolution 11.16 (Rev. COP13) on the illegal killing, taking and trade of migratory birds (IKB) to facilitate international cooperation as well as the implementation of the existing guidelines and action plans. Resolution 11.16 was adopted in 2014 in COP11, and has since been amended and updated in COP12 and COP13. There have also been a number of Decisions related to particular aspects of the work, e.g. Decisions 13.27 to 13.31 - Task Force on Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade of Migratory Birds in the Mediterranean (MIKT). Its Modus operandi was adopted in 2016.

MIKT is working as a catalyst to gather information scattered amongst diverse international organizations, and to help experts coordinate their work. The Mediterranean region is a hotspot for illegal killing, taking and trade of migratory birds (IKB), and MIKT is the first pan-Mediterranean task force aiming to serve, when appropriate, as a model approach for other parts of the world that also face IKB-related issues.

The Rome Strategic Plan







The Rome Strategic Plan 2020-2030: Eradicating Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade in Wild Birds in Europe and the Mediterranean region is the strategic framework for the work of MIKT from 2020-2030.

It was developed during a Joint Meeting of the Bern Convention Network of Special Focal Points (SFPs) on Eradication of Illegal Killing, Trapping and Trade (IKB) in Wild Birds and the CMS MIKT in May 2019 in Rome.

The overarching long-term goal of the Rome Strategic Plan is the eradication of IKB within the geographic scope of the Bern Convention and MIKT. The goal of the Rome Strategic Plan for 2030 is a 50% reduction of the scale and scope of IKB compared to a 2020 baseline.

MIKT members adopted the Rome Strategic Plan as it was adopted by the Bern Convention Standing Committee in December 2019, with the clear understanding that a detailed and ambitious workplan would be developed for specific actions to be implemented by MIKT Members and Observers in the Mediterranean.

The Rome Strategic Plan, was developed as a continuation of the MIKT Programme of Work 2016-2020 which ended in 2020. The MIKT Workplan for the period 2021-2025 is fully aligned with the Rome Strategic Plan and was approved through online consultation following the MIKT meeting in June 2021.

The Rome Strategic Plan is structured around one process-oriented objective and five result-oriented objectives, which are:

Process Oriented objective: National IKB Action Plans

Result Oriented objectives:

- No. 1: To understand the scope, scale and motivations behind illegal killing, taking and trade of birds;
- No. 2: To establish an active prevention of the illegal killing, taking and trade of birds;
- No. 3: To ensure that the illegal killing of birds is addressed effectively and efficiently in national legislation;
- No. 4: To ensure that effective and efficient enforcement of relevant legislation is undertaken;
- No. 5: To ensure effective and efficient justice for IKB-related offences.

Monitoring IKB



Rome Strategic Plan: Objective 1: To understand the scope, scale and motivations behind illegal killing, taking and trade of birds (IKB)

The first result-oriented objective of the Rome Strategic Plan is to have a good common understanding of the scale, scope and motivations behind IKB in a country. That means knowing how many birds are affected by IKB each year, which species, what methods are being used to kill or take those birds, during which seasons and in which parts of the country the IKB takes place. Additionally, it's important to know why IKB is taking place, i.e. what are the drivers and motivations behind it.

Although illegal activities are notoriously difficult to monitor, systematic monitoring nevertheless can provide an objective and comparable picture of IKB in a country. This monitoring can be used overtime to measure progress and assess the effectiveness of actions to address IKB, so that they can be reviewed and updated accordingly.

Additionally, systematic monitoring of IKB can help monitor progress in implementing actions to reach the Rome Strategic Plan goal of reducing IKB by 50% against a 2020 baseline. It is therefore recommended for all countries to have in place a system for monitoring IKB.

Setting a baseline and measuring progress in tackling IKB implies the adoption of a methodology for assessing the scale and scope of IKB in a repeatable and systematic way. Activities that lead to illegal killing, taking and trade of wild birds vary extensively, and depending on the activities and illegal methods used, the methodologies required for determining the scale and scope may differ. An agreed methodology that is followed in a systematic way on a regular basis is also crucial to reliably assess trends of IKB.

Monitoring motivations is also crucial for understanding the drivers from a socio-economic point of view. It is very important to understand those drivers in order to prepare effective work on prevention of IKB.

Ensuring National Legislation is Effective and Efficient against IKB

Rome Strategic Plan: Objective 3: To ensure that the illegal killing of birds is addressed effectively and efficiently in national legislation

The third result-oriented objective of the Rome Strategic Plan is the need to have efficient and effective national legislation for tackling illegal killing, taking and trade (IKB) in wild birds.

The Rome Strategic Plan foresees that the CMS Secretariat develops guidelines on effective legislation including examples of model legislation on combating IKB in collaboration with legal experts. The work is ongoing and is expected to be available during the course of 2022.

At the same time, the Rome Strategic Plan foresees that all countries undertake an expert assessment of national legislation addressing IKB to identify possible gaps, and then develop and/or amend national legislation to address such gaps, aiming for 100% of all countries to be covered by appropriate legislation.

Ensuring Enforcement is Effective and Efficient against IKB

Rome Strategic Plan: Objective 4: To ensure that effective and efficient enforcement of relevant legislation is undertaken

The fourth result-oriented objective of the Rome Strategic Plan is to undertake efficient and effective enforcement of relevant legislation for tackling illegal killing, taking and trade (IKB) of wild birds.

The Rome Strategic Plan foresees that IKB is afforded appropriate and proportionate enforcement priority at the national, sub-regional and local level. The actions foreseen emphasize the need for specialised training for enforcement personnel, and the development of enforcement units dealing with wildlife crime.

Additionally, the Rome Strategic Plan foresees that support is provided to facilitate effective implementation of inspection, surveillance, detection, investigation, prosecution and application of sanctions for IKB incidents by the designated law enforcement agencies. The actions foresee specialist support and production and provision of awareness raising material for relevant police forces, the development of a programme to facilitate exchanges between countries for training, capacity building, intelligence and other similar activities and the provision of adequate resources for enforcement personnel.

In May 2018, the CMS Secretariat and the European Network of Prosecutors for the Environment (ENPE) jointly organized a ground-breaking Workshop for Government Prosecutors on the Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade of Migratory Birds in the Mediterranean Region in Segovia, Spain, where all aspects of legislation, enforcement and justice were discussed and analysed. A training kit has been produced as outcome from this workshop and it is available in English, French, Spanish, Italian, Greek and Arabic.
