PROPOSED PROCESS FOR IDENTIFYING MEDIUM TERM IMPLEMENTATION PRIORITIES FOR THE WHALE AND DOLPHIN ACTION PLAN

(Prepared by the Secretariat)

1. The substantive provisions of the Pacific Cetaceans MoU are found in paragraph 1 (take steps to conserve cetaceans and fully protect those listed in CMS Appendix I), paragraph 2 (consider identifying or acceding to biodiversity-related instruments such as CMS), paragraph 3 (review or update legislation on cetaceans), paragraph 4 (implement the Action Plan subject to the availability of resources) and paragraph 5 (facilitate exchange of scientific, technical and legal information to coordinate conservation measures; co-operate with other states, inter-governmental and nongovernmental organisations).
2. The Whale and Dolphin Action Plan (WDAP) (2008-2012) is structured similarly, against the following main themes and objectives:
 - a. National, Regional and International Collaboration and Cooperation
 - i. Promote and enhance national, regional and international coordination, collaboration and partnership for whale and dolphin conservation in the Pacific Islands region
 - b. Threat reduction
 - i. To develop, test and disseminate effective mitigation techniques that reduce depredation and incidental by-catch, and to document the impact of Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated fishing on whales and dolphins in the Pacific Islands Region
 - c. Limit direct take to sustain populations
 - i. Improve our understanding on impacts of climate change on whales and dolphins
 - ii. Minimize impacts of pollution on whales and dolphins
 - iii. Support the development of sustainable eco-tourism practices in the region
 - iv. Ensure coastal developments take account of potential impacts on whale and dolphin populations
 - v. Improve information on ship strikes, acoustics, disease
 - d. Ecosystem/Habitat Protection
 - i. Support the designation and management of national whale/marine sanctuaries in the EEZs of SPREP members
 - ii. Identify key critical habitat, hotspots, and migratory pathways that are candidates for improved conservation.
 - e. Capacity Building
 - i. Increase in-country expertise, field capacity and regional cooperation
 - f. Education and Awareness
 - i. Develop communication strategies, training programs and protocols for key issues within the Whale and Dolphin Action Plan
 - ii. Increase awareness and understanding of whales and dolphins in the Pacific Islands Region
 - iii. Promote awareness regarding the value of traditional knowledge and practices in the management of whales and dolphins

- g. Cultural significance and value
 - i. To document the range of cultural practices, values and knowledge associated with whales and dolphins and encourage a more cohesive approach in policies and legislation
 - ii. Preserve and protect the traditional knowledge and values associated with whales & dolphins
 - iii. Ensure appropriate cultural knowledge, practices, and values inform and underpin management measures
- h. Legislation and Policy
 - i. Develop country level legal, policy and institutional framework to support the effective implementation of the Whale and Dolphin Action Plan
- i. Research and monitoring
 - i. Improve information received on stranding events in the Pacific Islands Region
 - ii. Identify key species and areas for baseline surveys
 - iii. Identify significance of and priority for toxicological research
- j. Whale and Dolphin-based Tourism
 - i. Foster sharing of lessons learnt and undertake regular assessment of the industry
 - ii. Ensure the best practice management of the whale and dolphin watching industry in the Pacific Islands Region
 - iii. Maximize educational and economic values of whale and dolphin watching

3. Under each objective, the SPREP membership have identified and agreed actions that have been prioritized.

4. It is growing practice for CMS agreements to develop medium term implementation priorities against agreed action plans. As with the Action Plan, the medium term implementation priorities would not be intended to be prescriptive or mutually exclusive.

5. It seems appropriate that the Signatories to the Pacific Cetaceans MoU should be given the opportunity to set such priorities, drawing from the Action Plan, and based on the information submitted in the national reports, as well as the information provided by Collaborating Organisations.

6. Drawing on the information provided in Annex A, Signatories are invited to consider entering into an email correspondence process to establish medium term implementation priorities by initially:

- a. reviewing the Whale and Dolphin Action Plan activity priorities and ascertaining which are of specific priority for Pacific Cetacean MoU Signatories
- b. identifying any new activities that are of particular relevance to Pacific Cetacean MoU Signatories; and
- c. indicating timescales for implementation of each activity as **(A)** – immediate-term (1-3 years), **(B)** – medium-term (3-5 years), **(C)** – long-term (up to 10 years).

7. This information would be collated and summarized by the Secretariat, with the possible support of the Open-ended Technical Advisory Group (agenda item 9.2) and redistributed to Signatories and Collaborating Organisations for additional input and the identification of Lead Countries, Territories or Collaborating Organisations that are prepared to facilitate progress of activities.

8. With this information again collected and collated, the Secretariat would circulate a draft document for eventual agreement by correspondence.

9. This document on medium term implementation priorities would form a basis of future Secretariat progress reports to the MoU Signatories.

10. It is understood that funding will be needed to support such prioritized activities and that multilateral, bilateral and other sources of funding will need to be sought.

Action requested:

The Signatories, and where appropriate other meeting participants, are requested to *inter alia*:

- Adopt the Secretariat proposal for an email correspondence process to establish medium term implementation priorities.
