DRAFT TERMS OF REFERENCE FOR SOUTH-WEST ASIA ILLEGAL TAKING OF MIGRATORY BIRDS INTERGOVERNMENTAL TASK FORCE

1. Decision 14.128 agreed at CMS COP14 in February 2024, requests the CMS Standing Committee to approve the Terms of Reference for the South-West Asia Illegal Taking of Migratory Birds Intergovernmental Task Force.
2. The Draft Terms of Reference presented in Annex 1 is the resulting document after discussion of an earlier draft during a meeting of the South-West Asia Working Group on illegal hunting, taking and trade of migratory birds, on 15-16 January 2024 in Riyadh, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia.
3. The changes agreed at the working group meeting in January 2024 are shown in the document. Text deletions in ~~strike through~~ and text additions in underlined text.

Participants are requested to:

- a) Finalise the Terms of Reference for the South-West Asia Illegal Taking of Migratory Birds Intergovernmental Task Force.
- b) Endorse the Final Terms of the Reference of the TF and officially mandate the Asian representative to the Standing Committee to present them for approval at the CMS Standing Committee in March 2025.

**DRAFT TERMS OF REFERENCE OF THE SOUTH-WEST ASIA ILLEGAL TAKING OF
MIGRATORY BIRDS INTERGOVERNMENTAL TASK FORCE**

(As amended at Working Group Meeting on 15 January 2024)

Background and purpose

This Task Force is established in line with the mandate provided by CMS Resolution 11.16 (Rev.COP13) “*The Prevention of Illegal Killing, Taking and Trade of Migratory Birds*” to assist the Parties to the Convention on Migratory Species (CMS) and its associated instruments, and other relevant MEAs to fulfil their obligations to protect migratory birds from illegal taking.

Goal

~~To ensure that no~~ Aim to eradicate illegal hunting, taking and trade of migratory birds (ITB) takes place in South-West Asia.

Role

To facilitate concerted efforts and procedures to combat ITB in South-West Asia.

Scope

The Task Force will be regional covering all range states in South-West Asia as follows: Bahrain, Iraq, Islamic Republic of Iran, Jordan, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates and Yemen.

The Task Force will cover all migratory bird taxa as identified by CMS and its relevant associated instruments, which regularly occur in the South-West Asian region.

Remit

The Task Force will:

- Support and guide a review on the status of hunting regulations related to migratory birds in the region;
- Coordinate and support the implementation of the South-West Asia IKB Action Plan;
- Support and guide a situation analysis on ITB in the region, building on the existing work of CMS MIKT in the Mediterranean and of the CMS Asia Pacific Task Force;
- Ensure synergies with other relevant CMS Institutional Frameworks, such as the African Eurasian Migratory Landbirds Action Plan (AEMLAP), the Raptors MOU and the Central Asian Flyway (CAF) Initiative.
- Promote and facilitate implementation of relevant decisions and plans adopted in the framework of MEAs or regional protocols and agreements (e.g. GCC, ROPME, PERSGA) ~~other frameworks, especially the CMS and Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC);~~
- Stimulate internal and external communication and exchange of information, experience, best practice and know-how;

- Assist in resource mobilization for priority actions identified in the action plan including cooperation with GCC;
- Monitor the implementation of the relevant decisions and plans and their effectiveness and regularly submit progress reports to the governing bodies of participating MEAs, including via an intergovernmental 'scoreboard' to monitor and indicate progress in eliminating IKB;
- Strengthen regional and international networks with experience on IKB e.g., International Consortium on Combating Wildlife Crime (ICWC); and
- Liaise and share experience with both the CMS MIKT and the Asia-Pacific Task Force and with any other working groups or task forces established under or outside the umbrella of the CMS.

Membership

The Task Force membership will be comprised of representatives of relevant government institutions in the field of environment, biodiversity conservation, game management, law enforcement and judiciary in the Parties to the participating MEAs in South-West Asia as follows: Bahrain, Iraq, Islamic Republic of Iran, Jordan, Kuwait, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, United Arab Emirates and Yemen.

It will also involve observers from the Secretariats of the participating MEAs and frameworks, as well as academic and other relevant institutions, the hunting and falconers ~~communities associations/clubs~~, NGOs, INGOs, GCC and other regional protocols, conventions and agreements (ROPME, PERSGA), development organizations, and other stakeholders, as appropriate.

In addition, the following representatives ~~will~~ might be invited to contribute to the Task Force:

- Representatives of Parties from the East African East Asian Flyway and beyond that wish to support the work of the Task Force;
- Representatives of the CMS Scientific Council, Raptors MOU, CAF Initiative, CMS MIKT, Asia-Pacific Task Force, AEW Technical Committee, CMS Preventing Poisoning Working Group, the African-Eurasian Migratory Landbirds Working Group, the Flyways Working Group, and other groups with relevant experience;
- Representatives from relevant IUCN specialist groups; and
- Relevant independent experts on ITB and on migratory bird ecology and policy.

Governance

The Task Force will elect a Chair and a Vice-Chair from amongst its members. ~~Decision making will be done by seeking consensus, as much as possible, among the group.~~

The Task Force will operate and will take decisions by seeking consensus, as much as possible among the ~~group~~ members of the Task Force and in accordance with a *modus operandi* which shall be developed once the Task Force is convened.

Operation

Funding permitting, a coordinator will be appointed by the Task Force with the following functions:

- organizing the meetings of the Task Force and preparing the background documents;
- maintaining and moderating the Task Force`s communication platform (website and intranet);
- facilitating implementation of decisions of the Task Force;
- facilitating fundraising and resource mobilization; and
- facilitating engagement with stakeholders within and beyond the Task Force.

Meetings of the Task Force will be convened at appropriate intervals, as considered necessary and funding permitting. Between meetings, business will be conducted electronically through an online workspace (intranet) within the Task Force`s website, which will provide the primary mode of communication.

In collaboration with Parties and relevant international organizations and subject to the availability of funds, the Task Force will organize regional workshops in trouble spot areas to assist in the development of appropriate local or regional solutions.
